WHAT'S NEW AROUND TOWN

SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS TO LOCUST GROVE BOULEVARD

Mayor and Council are pleased to announce the recent Phase I safety improvements being completed on Locust Grove Boulevard. The project is being partially funded through the NJDOT FY2009 Discretionary Aid.

The project incorporates a "complete streets" design which includes traffic calming to reduce speeding, new lane striping, bike paths and crosswalks, all of which have been funded by the Township with the assistance of NJDOT Discretionary Aid. Also included in the project are landscaping, seating and decorative lighting. Complete streets are roadways designed and operated to enable safe, attractive, and comfortable access and travel for all users. Pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists and public transport users of all ages and abilities are able to safely and comfortably move along and across a complete street. A ribbon cutting ceremony was held on Friday, October 23, 2009.

The project was awarded to Think Pavers Hardscaping, LLC of Woodbury, NJ.

OAK VALLEY NATURE PARK OPENS

On September 26th Deptford Township Mayor and Council held a ribbon-cutting event to celebrate the opening of the Township's newest park. A parcel of land located at the intersection of Stanford and Hamilton Avenues was purchased as part of an open space preservation initiative between Gloucester County and Deptford Township.

After the acquisition of the land, the County's Landscape Architect, Alan Koch, worked with the town to develop a passive recreation plan for the area. Once the review process was completed, Mayor and Council felt that this project offered a great opportunity to incorporate the help of Deptford Township's youth in the process.

Matthew Mungiole, of Boy Scout Troop 62, in an effort to help attain his Eagle Scout Badge, took on the responsibility of the walking trail portion of the plan . The first phase of Matt's Eagle Scout project included clearing the area of all debris and underbrush. He enlisted the help of his fellow scouts to assist in the clean up. Once the area was cleared, construction of the walking trail began to take place. Both the Parks & Recreation and Public Works departments worked with the scouts on Saturdays throughout the summer. The two township departments provided the machinery and operators, while the scouts performed the manual

The construction of the park is still a work in progress, as fencing and a playground unit for younger children are scheduled to be installed. A second scout, Henry Grabbe, is also completing an Eagle Scout project by constructing bat houses and park benches that the scouts will install. Once fully complete, the park will offer recreation opportunities for residents of all ages.

A Message from Our Mayor

Our Administration works diligently on many issues every day. We strive to be proactive in public safety, property maintenance issues, and infrastructure improvements just to name a few. As you look around town you will see improvements and construction to many areas. These improvements are being funded with grant money or low interest bonding.

In October, several ribbon cutting ceremonies were held for many exciting projects such as safety improvements to Locust Grove Boulevard. The project incorporates a design which includes traffic calming to reduce speeding, new lane striping, bike paths and crosswalks, all of which have been funded by the Township with the assistance of state grant money. October also welcomed the opening of a seven-acre open space park in Oak Valley. The purchase was made by the Gloucester County Open Space Preservation Program with funds from Gloucester County Freeholders and Deptford Township.

The new reconstruction of the 50 year old clubhouse for the Oak Valley Athletic Association has begun with 100 percent of the funding coming from donations. Phase II of the safety improvements to Deptford Center Road will soon be completed with grant money from NJDOT. The improvements include road reconstruction and pedestrian/ bike paths, and a new LED traffic sig-

nal. If you have been to Fasola Park recently, then I hope you have noticed the new steps and a paver walkway from the Bexhill Farms development, and new tennis courts will be completed by spring. All of the recent improvements at Fasola Park have been funded through Gloucester County Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) grant money.

Some of our initiatives include a Speeding Awareness Program, Anti-Crime Partnership, Economic Development Committee and much more. As you can see, the Administration has worked very hard to gain funding from County and State representatives. The ability to obtain funding saves tax dollars.

Deptford Township Police Department is proud to have two police officers enrolled in the Gloucester County Police Academy, and have hired seven new police officers in the last three years. Throughout the economic downfall, we have avoided layoffs, reduction in services and maintained a stable tax rate. On the average, Deptford Township has the third lowest tax rate in Gloucester County.

We hope that you are excited and pleased with the completed and ongoing improvement projects around the town. Deptford Township is in a great location, with quick access to jobs, terrific recreation opportunities, and a

variety of dining and shopping for your every need. Thanks for helping us make Deptford the best town in South Jersey!

DO YOU KNOW YOUR GOVERNMENT?

Deptford Township uses the Council-Manager form of government. The Township Council is made up of seven elected members. The Council is the legislative body of the municipality and provides for appointments of members of Boards, Commissions and Authorities. Perhaps most importantly, the council appoints a qualified manager to serve as the chief executive.

Our mayor is elected by his peers. The mayor serves as the presiding member of Council. The Township Manager has the full administrative responsibility for the municipality, including appointment of department heads as well as subordinates, preparation and presentation of the budget and the negotiation of contracts.

Understanding Your Tax Dollars at Work

Wondering how your tax dollars are appropriated? Your Municipal tax dollars are allocated to operate our local municipal services such as police, public works, trash collection and salaries. Your tax bill is mailed from and paid to the Deptford Township government offices. However, the Township does not use all of your tax dollars. We act as the central receiving point for the tax money and allocate the funds to various taxing districts as mandated by the State of New Jersey.

Please review the breakdown listed below to assist you in determining where you tax dollars are appropriated



During the summer and early fall leaves are picked up through the Yard Waste Program.

Leaf collection runs from November through Mid-January each year. Please remember to keep leaves away from vehicles so leaf machines will have easy access to the leaves. Leaves must be placed at the curb, free of any rocks, branches, twigs, dirt or other debris so they can easily be vacuumed up without causing damage to the machines.

Do not place leaves on top of or close to storm sewer outlets.

All stumps and logs should be free of dirt and debris and cut to 24". Please note: This service IS NOT offered to builders and/or contractors.

SNOW REMOVAL



Deptford Township realizes the importance of snow removal to our residents as well as for the overall maintenance of our roadways. Our goal is to have all Township roads cleared within a reasonable time depending on weather conditions. Upon notice of a snow warning (4" or more inches), all Township roads will be salted prior to the snow's arrival. At 4" of accumulation our vehicles will begin plowing. During a snow emergency, parking is PROHIBITED

on all roads designated as SNOW EMERGENCY ROUTES. Parked cars cause a severe problem and residents have ample warning <u>NOT</u> to park on snow-covered streets. The Police Department and Code Enforcement will strictly enforce the ordinance by issuing summons.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Recently, the New Jersey State Police released the annual *Uniform Crime Report* (UCR) outlining the 2008 crime statistics for our community. I hope to answer some of those questions in my latest message to the public and reassure everyone that our police department is positioned well to address these and other public safety issues moving into 2010.

First, you should know that the police department has its own way of tracking crime and police service statistics using an internal Records Management System (RMS). We do not wait for the release of the annual UCR reports to develop strategies to deal with crime in our community. In fact, we prepare a monthly report for the Township Manager regarding our town's crime statistics as well as reporting UCR crime statistics to the State Police, in accordance with statutory law. We know what our local crime stats are well in advance of the final annual reports. Furthermore, we have invested capital improvement funds in the development of a new RMS system that will provide us with more relevant and real time information and analysis of police statistics to assist us in deployment strategies of our Police Officers. We are also looking forward to producing crime mapping models to better predict crime and traffic control (accident) trends that will assist us in our enforcement efforts.

We use the release of the State's UCR report in a broader sense to compare crime trends and correlate the statistics in support of the need for police. We use the UCR and internal data and analytical reports like *Patrol Workload Analysis* to determine the correct staffing numbers to accomplish our goals and objectives. The Office of the Chief of Police produces annual reports, including our fiscal year budget recommending staffing numbers for police officers. We do this to ensure that we are staffed consistent with other communities experiencing similar crime rates and needs; and so that we can provide the highest level of public safety to our citizens. Cost is certainly a factor we consider, but it is only one aspect of our periodic an annual analysis that goes into the staffing decisions made with our local government officials.

While it is interesting to look at the Crime Statistics on an annual basis and note the fluctuation in numbers, we look at these numbers and our internal data over a longer period of time. We feel that five and ten year trends provided us with a better picture to gauge outcomes. I prepared a ten year analysis of UCR data and average our crime rate numbers. Our crime rate may be higher this year than last, but it is not as high as it has been in the recent past. In 2002, our non-violent crime rate was at 65.5 per 1000 residents; and it has peaked at over 60 for three of the last ten years. The ten year trend shows it lowering from those numbers. It is also important to note that our violent crime rate has continued to drop since 2002. Finally, you must keep in mind Crime Rates are a calculation of Crimes per 1000 Residents. These rates tend to be more reliable when you can accurately account for your local population and do not take into account visiting population. Our community's population has grown since the last Census Report, and although the State and Federal Government tries to be accurate in terms of population from year to year, we won't have our exact new population until after the next Census Report, which is due out in 2010.

Each community is different and must be analyzed with many different considerations in mind when determining true crime rates. As an example, Deptford Township is host to the County's Educational School District (GCIT, Gloucester County College, and the Special Services and Autism Schools); and a regional shopping district, with major retailers like the Deptford Mall and many large box stores like (2 Wal-Mart's), Target store, BJ's Wholesalers, and Sam's Club, just to name a few. If you were to take into account the population increase our community experiences everyday due to these factors, our non-violent and violent crime rates would be considerably lower.

Crime statistics never tell the whole story. While we feel they are important, they need to be analyzed with some clarity to illustrate the true picture of life in a community. It is important to note that our violent crime rate is lower than last year and has been trending lower for the past several years. This is a good thing and may be due in part to added police efforts and our Anti-Crime Partnership with the Gloucester County Prosecutor's Office. However, we have shown and increase in non-violent crime rate and I have analyzed the data and

believe it to be a result of an increase in what we call "economic based crimes". In 2008, we reported increases in reported burglaries and thefts, as did many other communities in our County and State. We also reported increases in domestic violence offenses in 2008. I believe these increases are a direct reflection of the recent state and national economic troubles. Crime rates are affected by many factors, not the least of which is the economy. The economy also has an effect on domestic violence offenses. I believe that the increases we have seen in the area of domestic violence are related to our Township's change or the increase in high density communities, like apartment complexes and the economy. The Mayor has directed the police to be proactive in the area of apartment complexes and we are working hard to partner with them in the interest of providing better public safety services to this unique sector of our community.

Although crime rate increases are never considered good news, the Police Department wants the public to know that we are continually monitoring these changes and making the necessary adjustments to police services in the interest of addressing these as well as a number of other public safety issues. We are working with local government and our community leaders to develop crime reduction strategies and address other public safety issues every day. I can say without question, our local government has been extremely helpful and understanding of police service needs of our community and works with the police department on a regular basis to keep our community safe.

By working with local government officials, like the Manager's Office and Mayor and Council, we have implemented a number of new police initiatives designed to make a difference in our community's public safety. We have implemented a new *Juvenile Unit* in our police department designed to oversee all of the juvenile related functions under the direction of the Criminal Investigations Division. This Unit includes (1) Police Supervisor & (1) Detective (Township funded); and (2) School Resources Officers, which are funded by the school district. We also have reallocated a Supervisor and (5) Police Officers to the Patrol Division to work in the Police Department's first *Anti-Crime Unit*. These Police Officers work expanded hours (10 hour shifts) on a variety of directed patrols designed to impact criminal activity. These officers also work traffic control and enforcement assignments, and cover the Deptford Mall Sub-Station on the weekend nights. Finally, we have several Detectives assigned to work in partnership with County, State, and Federal law enforcement agencies on Task Forces designed to combat crime in our community and region.

I am extremely proud of the work our Police Officers do. I know they are hard working individuals who work to ensure public safety and make our community better. I know that 2010 will be challenging and am prepared to address those challenges by working with local government. One major challenge is in the area of funding for new and replacement Police Officers. We are extremely fortunate in that we have not had to implement layoffs in the Police Department, and our Mayor and Council have worked hard to find the funds needed to hire and replace police officers. While it is true that we are a few police officers shy of past year's numbers, we have managed staffing well using overtime funds and our Special Law Enforcement Officer, Class I program.

We have applied for funding from the federal government to replace police officers under the Cops Hiring and Rehiring Program (CHRP) and are hopeful that we will be awarded federal money in 2010. Deptford Township is the only municipality in the County to sponsor (2) full–time police officers in the Gloucester County Police Academy this year, and we anticipate those police officers will be ready to serve in December of this year. We are also preparing our 2010 police budget and looking to replace Police Officer(s). Working with the Prosecutor's Office and independently, we have secured a number of State and Federal grants for crime reduction and intend to use them wisely in the upcoming year. We have more than \$100,000 in grant funds for use in the area of crime reduction and prevention; anti-crime strategies; drug abuse education; drunken driving enforcement and saturated patrols; and aggressive driving enforcement patrols.

Mayor and Council have committed to public safety time and time again. I am confident that we will address a number of public safety issues successfully in the next year. The safety of all the citizens who live and visit our community is ever present on my mind, and I will ensure that we continue to do our best to make living and visiting Deptford Township a positive experience.


