Permits are required for the soft wall (storable) type pools as follows:

If the pool is capable of holding twenty-four or more inches of water, a Zoning Permit will be required for each year. A Building Permit will also be required for the installation of a permanent barrier that the Building Code mandates. An electrical permit will NOT be required as long as there is a GFCI receptacle within twenty-five feet of the pool. Zoning Permits are REQUIRED annually. Please note NO pools will be grandfathered.

PLAYGROUNDS AND PARKS

We are now close to completion on our program to renovate and/or install new equipment in every playground in Deptford. This has been a 3 year project. Playgrounds not only provide recreation, they are great exercise for kids and adults. They bring neighborhoods and the community together and they are simply a fun place to hang out with the kids.

Open space preservation, parks, playgrounds and our farm are all a part of our goal to preserve and secure the future of environment in Deptford. We have a master plan in place that includes controlling growth knowing that there will be future development but it must occur in a controlled and planned out methodology.

CANS

Aluminum and Steel

NO BAGS

Plastic grocery bags are recyclable, just not in your curbside program because they get caught in the sorting equipment. Please take these back to the grocery store so they can be recycled separately.



NO TANGLERS

"Tanglers" are items such as garden hoses, electrical cords, Christmas light strings, chains, clothing, metal hangers, or any such item that can wrap around equipment at a recycling processing facility. Just put these in the trash.



NO FOOD

Never put food in the recycle bin! This contaminates the other items in the bin and makes them not recyclable so they end up in a land-fill anyways. This also goes for food-soiled items such as paper plates, greasy pizza boxes, or fast food containers. Just put these in the trash. Remember: Empty, Clean, and Dry for recycling. If you want to make your food waste useful, start a compost pile!



NO BATTERIES

Batteries are recyclable, just not in your curbside program because they cause dangerous situations for recycling workers. Batteries can spark when they come in contact with various other materials in the recycling truck or facility, which can cause fires. Too often an entire truck load of recyclables is ruined because a battery started a fire on the truck.



NOT SURE?

When in doubt, throw it out.

Placing an item in the recycle bin that does not belong can be costly, dangerous, and could contaminate or ruin other recyclables. Items that are not recyclable are removed from the recycling stream and sent to the landfill anyways.

INFORMATION

We want to tell you some new improvements to government operations. After in depth discussions in the year 2019 Deptford Council created and formed by Ordinance a Public Safety Committee in January 2020. The discussions and debates centered around uniting our community working with our partners in the Fire District, School District, Police Department, autonomous agencies like the MUA, volunteers and residents. Council and all of our elected officials have created an era of cooperation unheard of in other administrations. We all know working together, sharing thoughts, ideas and plans can only brighten our future and improve our community.

The committee is a work in progress. We are creating a roadmap as we move along with the intent to provide for the health, safety and welfare of every resident. We have a large visiting population also and we need to ensure that their Deptford experience is a great one. Public safety is a complex concept. The issues are how to coordinate efforts between police, fire, schools and our large business community. Our community is growing and Township Council always looks to the future while planning for today.

There is currently a public safety director position which has been in place since 1972. It became time to reinvent the position to coordinate and ensure the operations of all agencies involved in public safety. Again Deptford Township was at the forefront of the efforts now being discussed to examine public safety and to keep improving. The old saying "that's the way we have always done it" does not fit in our way of thinking and governing. Our job is to keep improving on the existing ways and even at the risk of missteps to keep creating new ways to improve our community.

Our commitment is change, to improvements and to you. We will meet our challenges working together!

Deptford Community Center: This was previously Most Holy Redeemer Church, we purchased this in 2018. After some code work we immediately put the property to use. A new state of the art floor was installed in the gymnasium. The gym is under constant use by our recreation programs. The Gloucester County Ambulance squad will be based here to protect and serve our township. The school and classrooms are booked for youth karate classes, boy scouts and girl scouts programs, art classes, Civic organizations and at the same time renovations are continuing to expand much needed space.

There is a 3 acre playing field in the back which will be used by our youth sports organizations for much needed space. The church is being converted for this area's first performing/cultural arts center. Coming soon will be a stage for youth and adult performing arts classes and performances. We plan to incorporate singing, dancing, plays and music lessons and performances for every age from 3 years old to 100. We also will be using the basement and building for art classes and to display local art work and sculptures.

Our recent open space purchases have added tremendously to our preserved space inventory. The Andaloro Farm purchase has turned in to an outstanding community garden, museum, play area and open space that fronts Timber Creek to preserve our waterways and wildlife.

Almonesson Lake is a 17 acre environmental gem that you can access from our kayak and canoe ramp off of Good Intent Road.

You should visit the Old Pine Trust preservation in Blackwood Terrace. It is a beautiful stretch of nature cared for by the Old Pine Trust conservatory.

That's just a few areas that are new and exciting to Deptford Township. Please go out and visit and experience all Deptford Township has to offer.
