

MESSAGE TO OUR RESIDENTS

Over the course of 2023, there have been exciting new changes to our police department. Early this year, a new Chief of Police, Joseph Smith, was sworn into office. Chief Smith is a long-time member of the police department and is a life-long Deptford resident. He previously served as Captain in charge of the Patrol Division. On August 7th, seven officers received promotions, and a new officer was sworn into office. Currently, the police department is in the process of hiring eleven new police officers. These individuals are in various stages of training at police academies in southern New Jersey. By the beginning of 2024, there will be plenty of new faces working alongside our dedicated police officers responding to calls of service, and helping to keep Deptford safe and secure for our residents.

VISIBLE HOUSE NUMBERS ARE IMPORTANT FOR EMERGENCIES

Our emergency responders need your help. Clearly identifying your house number is imperative for all emergency services including police, fire and ambulance. Seconds count in a life or death situation—when a responder is looking for the right home it can be devastating to lose precious moments. If the numbers on your home are not easy to find or read, it will take longer for crews to reach you.

Please ensure your house numbers meet the following requirements:

- Must be Arabic numerals. Fancy numbers or numbers that are spelled out may be aesthetically pleasing, but are very difficult to read from the street.
- Need to be a minimum of four (4) inches high and in a reflective or contrasting color to their immediate background.
- Must be displayed on the front of the dwelling and visible from the street.
- If the dwelling is located more than 45 feet from the front lot line, the number should be displayed on a gate post, fence, mailbox, or other appropriate place at least 24 inches above ground level and within ten (10) feet of your driveway opening.
- Cannot be obstructed by shrubs, trees, decorations, etc.

Take a moment to look at your house number. Make sure your numbers follow the above guidelines. It will help emergency crews find you quickly and easily.

TOWNSHIP ESTABLISHES SECURITY TASKFORCE WITH LOCAL RETAILERS



Recently, Deptford Township officials and members of the Deptford Police Department met with retail security representatives and business owners to discuss crime prevention strategies in the commercial business district. Chief Joe Smith discussed taking a multifaceted approach leveraging increased police presence with code enforcement, new technology and information sharing between retailers, police and township officials.

To advance these objectives, Deptford Township has launched a Retail Security Taskforce to deter retail crime and strengthen existing partnerships between police, township officials and the retail community. In the coming days, the Taskforce will be launching a public relations campaign highlighting the positive steps being taken to increase security in the shopping district. The campaign format will include social media, website postings, retail signage, public service announcements and community events. The goal is to raise public awareness by emphasizing police activity and targeting would-be offenders.

SLAM THE SCAM!

Recently, some Deptford seniors have become the targets of what are commonly referred to as "Grandparent Scams." Scammers contact a senior victim pretending to be their grandchild. Often, the "grandchild" will make up a stressful situation, such as being involved in a serious motor vehicle crash, or being arrested. The scammers will then ask for payment to have the grandchild released. Payments are often requested in the form of gift cards or cash. Unfortunately, these scams have cost some of our seniors thousands and thousands of dollars.

If you receive a call from an unknown number, don't be afraid to ask questions. Ask questions only your family member will know. NEVER SEND PAYMENT WITHOUT FIRST CONTACTING A TRUSTED FAMILY MEMBER, FRIEND, OR LAW ENFORCEMENT. These scammers rely on your manners and they will pressure you to keep things secret. Don't do it! Do not be afraid to simply hang up. Remember: "Slam The Scam!" The easiest way

to combat these scammers is to avoid speaking with them in the first place.

The men and women of the Deptford Township Police Department are here for you; 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Never hesitate to call us if you have questions regarding a suspicious phone call. Our non-emergency number is (856) 845-2220. In an emergency, dial 911.







To maintain safety and the wellbeing of our police officers, the Township recently purchased four Dodge Durangos and a Ford Explorer. Additionally, each officer is being provided Individual First Aid Kits (IFAK) and new outer vest carriers. These purchases help ensure that all officers are equipped with the tools they need to conduct their job safely and effectively. The vehicles are currently being upfitted with all required equipment, and will be hitting the streets soon!

CLERK'S OFFICE

The Township Clerk is the Chief Administrator of Elections, Chief Registrar of Voters and any other duties that may be imposed by state statute. The Clerk's Office strives to accommodate the needs of the Township residents while serving Council, Administration and all other offices with professional, efficient and friendly service. Our office, known as the "Hub of the Township," is custodian of all municipal records such as meeting minutes, books, bonds, contracts and archival records, and the custodian of the Township Seal.

The Township Clerk has core duties, such as Secretary to the Governing Body, and responsibility for the preparation of all Council meeting agendas, keeping official records of the proceedings of every Council meeting, legal advertisements, administration and record of Oaths of Office, and liaison to the public on behalf of the Governing Body.

Our office issues various licenses, such as Liquor Licenses, Bingo & Raffles, Carnivals, Block Party requests, Social Affair Permits and Amusement Licenses.

We offer Notary Public Service, which is free for Deptford Township Senior Citizens, and \$2.50 a page for all other Township residents.



LITTER PATROL

Deptford Township Litter Patrol community cleanup service is designed to utilize citizens who are sentenced to community service hours. We have an excellent program director and support team. Keeping Deptford clean and protecting our neighborhoods from any kind of blight or nuisance is a priority. Council has enacted many nuisance ordinances such as an anti-graffiti law, a ban on ATV riding in the community sections, and vacant home cleanups and liens. We also ask your help in patrolling neighborhoods for litter and cleanup-if you notice a problem, contact the Township Manager's Office or Public Works Department through our online service request form. Let's work together to keep our neighborhoods safe

SPECIAL NEEDS REGISTRY

The Gloucester County Special Needs Registry is a free, voluntary service open to all citizens with special needs who reside, attend school or are employed in Gloucester County. The registry was created to help police officers and other emergency service personnel better assist residents with special needs in the event of an emergency by providing first responders with vital information regarding a registrant's special needs, emergency contact information, physical description and current photograph of the registrant.

Registrants will be provided with a window decal that can be placed on the front entrance of their residence or on the window of any vehicle in which they regularly travel. Registrants will also receive a blue envelope to assist special needs drivers and police officers during interactions.

All information provided on the registry will remain strictly confidential and will only be utilized by first responders during times of emergency.

To register, go to the Gloucester County Prosecutor's Office tab on the Gloucester County website (www.gloucestercountynj.gov), download and complete the Special Needs Registry Form under the Informative Links tab, and submit the completed form to any police department in Gloucester County. Police departments throughout the county also have copies of the form available.

- Please remember to keep leaves away from vehicles and not to park on leaf piles
 so leaf machines will have easy access to the leaves. Leaves must be placed at the
 curb free of any rocks, branches, twigs, dirt, pet waste, horse manure or other
 debris in order for them to be vacuumed up easily and not cause damage to
 machines.
- Leaves not put to the curb for pickup during this scheduled leaf pickup will have to wait until the beginning of the Spring Clean-up Program or our Yard Waste Program to be picked up.
- Please note that our Yard Waste Pickup Program runs all year. Yard waste debris such as grass, flowers, plants, small limbs, and "leaves" are required to be placed in containers or biodegradable paper bags at the curb for pickup.
- Loose leaves placed at the curb, instead of in cans, will only be collected during our scheduled leaf collection programs.

Reminder:

- No Plastic Bags
- No Sticks Or Other Debris
- Place Leaves At Curb Line

ZONES:

As noted below, each "Zone" includes several areas & developments, each with varying amounts of leaves. We will be in each zone three (3) times. Each zone will be completed before moving to the next zone. Every effort should be made to have leaves at curbside before the first day of each scheduled visit to ensure timely pickup. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

- Zone 1: Blackwood Terrace, Almonesson, Garden City, Sunset Park, Hunter's Gate, Willow Ridge, Woodmere Mews, Heritage Woods, Valley Green Estates. Boundary Limits: Almonesson Road, Rt. 41, Clements Bridge Road, Bull Run Creek and all adjoining residential streets.
- Zone 2: Westville Grove,
 Westville Oaks, North Woodbury,
 Woodbury Gardens, Locust
 Grove, Blanchard's Landing,
 Ladd's Landing, Heritage
 Development, Patriots Ridge.

Are You Shoveling Snow the Right Way?

Take these 6 precautions to protect your heart:

- Take frequent breaks to avoid overstressing your heart.
- 2 Don't drink alcohol right before or after shoveling.
- If you feel any signs of a **heart attack**, stop shoveling and call 9-1-1 immediately.
- 4 Push snow, rather than lifting it.
 - Use **good form** if you do need to lift, do so with your legs, not your back.
 - Take it slow and lighten your load.

LEAF RAKING & SNOW SHOVELING SAFETY TIPS

There are some simple steps you can take to keep safe while working in the yard this fall and winter. It's all about planning ahead and being mindful of your movements.

- Before a snowstorm begins, apply (pet-friendly) deicer or rock salt to your sidewalk and steps. This will make clearing snow and ice easier after the storm ends.
- Do not rake or shovel after eating or while smoking.
- Wear shoes with non-skid soles and adequate arch support.
- Wear gloves and long sleeves to protect your hands and arms.
- Choose a rake/shovel that is appropriate for your size and strength.

- Warm up and stretch your muscles before you begin.
- Shovel only fresh, powdery snow; it's lighter.
- Push snow rather than lift it. If you must lift, use a small shovel or only partially fill the shovel. Avoid twisting motions, keep your back straight, and bend with the knees and hips. Keep the load light and stop working if you feel pain in your back.
- Switch hands every few minutes to prevent overuse on one side of the body.
- Avoid laying rakes/shovels on the ground where you can step on or trip over them.
- Stay hydrated and take frequent breaks. Do not work to the point of exhaustion.
- Don't pick up that shovel without a doctor's permission if you have a history of heart disease.
- Know the signs of a heart attack; stop immediately and call 911 if you experience any of them. *Every minute counts*.
- Help elderly or disabled neighbors remove snow from steps and sidewalks.
- Clear catch basins and fire hydrants.
- Please do not put snow in the street. Put all cleared snow, from parked cars and sidewalks, in the "tree box," front yard, or between the curb and sidewalk.
- When you're done, take a slow walk around the yard or sit and stretch to relax and cool down your muscles.

If you think you've injured yourself after a vigorous day of yard cleanup, and rest, heat/ice or over-the-counter medications have not improved your pain or function, consider calling your primary care physician or checking out physical therapy. They can work with you to address pain, improve function, improve strength, restore joint mobility, restore range of motion and help get you back doing the things you enjoy.

Here are some reminders for our residents which will help our Public Works staff perform their jobs safely and effectively through the fall and winter months:

Fall

- No other debris in leaf piles: no branches, sticks, hay, etc.
- Keep leaf piles off of storm water grates
- Sticks, hay, and other compost go into open yard waste containers and will be collected the day after regular trash day
- Chipper will be going out as needed along with log pick up
- Storm water and water way inspection/ cleanup

Winter

- Brine and salt trucks will address all primary and secondary roads, as well as known problem areas first
- Keep parked vehicles and trailers off of snow covered roadways for optimal and efficient plowing
- Do not shovel snow from sidewalks or driveways into the street during plowing
- We do not deploy our plows until snow reaches 4 inches or more. We evaluate snow on an hourly basis.
- Report potholes immediately by calling Public Works or utilizing our service request program

Recycling Can Replacements

- Any Recycling can that needs replacing or fixing please utilize our service request program or call the Public Works office.
- Recycling cans are usually replaced or fixed the day of regular scheduled trash collection

DEPTFORD PARKS

Deptford has 17 great parks/playgrounds for our families to enjoy year-round. If you haven't been to your local park in a while, why not visit and see the upgrades we've made over the past few years? Most recently, we've added bike parks next to Pine Acres Early Childhood Center, and



at the lower level of Deptford Memorial Park. The Deptford Dog Park also saw numerous upgrades this past year. Take advantage of these beautiful green spaces.



Recreation opportunities in Deptford Township are endless and there is a program for every age. We want to talk about the volunteers who run all these organizations—they are the key to our successful leagues and programs. We actually have a volunteer Hall of Fame in Deptford to honor those who have dedicated their time to Deptford programs.

One of our volunteers made national news this past season. Deptford Little League President Don Bozzuffi instituted a plan to help diffuse fans from acting inappropriately towards our volunteer umpires at baseball games. His ideas traveled around the country's news cycle and we commend him and his league officers for this unique idea.

All of our volunteers are trained by Rutgers certified instructors before they are allowed to be on the field coaching. Some of those certified instructors are even coaching right here in Deptford, and have literally taught thousands of volunteers this course.

RECYCLING INFORMATION

Deptford Township has a robust recycling program. We'd like to use this space to address some frequently asked questions from our residents, to clear up any misconceptions and ensure we're getting the maximum benefit from recycling.

Deptford uses single stream recycling, meaning containers (bottles, cans, etc.) are commingled with paper (newspaper, cardboard, etc.). However–not ALL paper, plastic and metal is eligible to be recycled. Any non-recyclable material will contaminate a batch and cause a number of problems, so remember: "When in doubt, throw it out!"

MATERIAL THAT MUST BE RECYCLED

Corrugated Cardboard

Large cardboard boxes must be cut down or flattened in order to be placed in tote.

Newspaper

Newsprint (including the advertisements found in newspapers)

Mixed Paper

Mail, magazines, office and colored paper; regular and window envelopes; receipts; glossy inserts; telephone books; chipboard and paperback books; greeting cards; brown craft paper bags; and non-metallic wrapping paper.

Glass Bottles & Jars

Clear, green and brown bottles and jars. Rinse out bottles and jars and place in tote.

Aluminum, Steel & Tin Cans

Beverage and food cans. Rinse cans and place in tote.

Plastic Containers Only

Beverage and laundry containers with #1 PET and #2 HDPE symbols (located on the bottom or side of the container). Rinse out containers.

Mixed Paper/Cardboard/Chipboard etc.

All Cardboard and Chipboard MUST BE RECYCLED. Large Cardboard boxes need to be broken down so that they can be collected.

Here are some examples of accepted materials: Newspaper, junk mail, office type paper, corrugated cardboard, cereal boxes, etc.

MATERIAL THAT CANNOT BE RECYCLED

Items that will NOT be recycled under this program include toys, plastic bags, bubble wrap, ovenware, ceramic and polystyrene cups and plates, styrofoam, pots and pans, baking pans, drinking glasses, mirrors, automobile windshields, light bulbs, window glass, wax coated boxes, pizza boxes, 6-pack beverage holders, flower pots, plastic bags, comforters, pillows, rugs and all other miscellaneous plastics. All these items must be placed in household trash.

RECYCLING TOTERS REGULATIONS:

- Place the Toter at curbside no earlier than 6pm the night before your scheduled pick up and no later than 6am on the day of your scheduled pickup.
- The Toters must be placed no further than 3 feet from the edge of the street with the wheels facing your house and the front of the Toter facing the street.
- Toters must not be placed behind cars, mailboxes, telephone poles or any obstruction that will make it difficult for the operator to pick it up.
- These Toters are meant for recycling services only.
- Recycling should include: Cans/ Bottles/ Plastics/ Cardboard/ Paper products.
- Cut up large pieces of cardboard so they will fit inside the container easily.
- Do not jam large piece of cardboard inside the Tote, this could stop the Tote from emptying when dumped into the truck.
- Do not place inside the Toter: Trash/ Grass/ Wood/ Dirt/ Paint cans/ Hazardous chemicals Styrofoam, vinyl or any other materials that are not part of the Deptford Township's Recycling Program.
- All recycling must be placed inside the Toter for collection. If you have excessive amounts of cardboard you must flatten, bundle and place at the curb for Monday pickup.. Residents need to call the Public Works Department to have a work order placed for pickup. If you have any questions please call 856-228-4719 between 7:00am. 3:30pm.





BACK TO SCHOOL




NEW INITIATIVES IN DEPTFORD SCHOOLS

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Municipal codes are designed to ensure compliance with safety and health standards and allow our Code Officials to follow the IPMC regulations. This code covers residential properties, businesses, apartments and vacant land. They are protecting property values and quality of life issues. If you recognize a chronic safety or health issue with a property, call the office or put in a service request on our website. One of our officials will visit the property to ensure compliance. Thank you for your patience as we resolve issues with these properties-it can be very difficult to find owners, place fines and then get judgments to ensure compliance. The ultimate goal is clean, safe neighborhoods and roads.

Please be advised that if you own a residential property in Deptford Township, and do not reside there as your primary residence, you will need to register as a Landlord for that property. A new Certificate for Change in Tenant will be required for any new tenancy at that property.

Rental properties constructed prior to 1978 are required to be certified free from lead-based paint hazards per New Jersey State P.L. 2021 c182. Our Code Enforcement Department will be reaching out to those property owners to schedule inspections to comply with the State requirements.

THE AMERICAN FLAG CODE

The USA Flag Code establishes rules for displaying and care of the American Flag, a symbol of freedom to which Americans recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

The flag's 13 alternating red and white stripes represent the 13 original colonies, while the 50 white stars represent the 50 states.

Red represents valor; white represents purity and innocence; blue represents vigilance,

The flag flies at half-staff when the nation or a state is in mourning. The president, a state governor or the Mayor of the District of Columbia can order flags to half-staff upon:

- The death of a military member, a government official or a first responder.
- A national tragedy.
- Memorial Day or another national day of remembrance.

Let's keep these points in mind as we continue to fly the colors with respect and pride.

TAX INFORMATION

Please make note of our Deptford Township's due dates for taxes: February 1, May 1, August 1 and November 1. The grace period is until the 10th of the month due–after that, interest will accrue to the account. The Tax Office hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8:30am-4:30pm, excluding holidays as the office will be closed. We accept payment in person in the form of cash, check or money order. Please note: if paying by debit or credit card, whether in office or online, there is a service charge of 2.95% on the total amount paid by the servicing agent. We have a secure drop box located at the main entrance of the building for payments. The drop box is checked several times throughout the work day.




